





Ch2: Why do you think Lili said, "*I'm not used to hearing about people like me; it seemed too wonderful to be true.*" What does she mean?

REFLECT AND RESPOND

Ch3: Using the track sheet, record what you know about the main characters so far. Use *quotes* from the text to back up your thoughts. Keep your sheet up to date as we learn more about them.

Ch4: Why does Gran tell Lili that she's got to "*out-nice*" Tom? Do you think it will work? Why/Why not?

CREATE SOMETHING GREAT

Design a new Olympic clothing kit for the country of your choice. Have a look at past Olympic kits and uniforms for ideas. **OR**

Research: In your group, using an atlas or the internet, research and plot the route by sea from China to Britain via Calcutta.


Where is *Calcutta* and why is it now called *Kolkata*?

REFLECT AND RESPOND

Ch7: What two things does Eric want to do with his life?

What is your *ambition*? What would you like to do or be when you are older?

REFLECT AND RESPOND

Ch8: Sophie was “*living proof that you can’t pigeonhole people.*” Why?

Look up and note the dictionary *definition*.

Who else in the book is *pigeonholed*? What does it mean? Why are people pigeonholed?

READ AND UNDERSTAND

Ch8: What do we learn about Billy Battle? Why did he pretend the stopwatch has stopped working?

p45: Find the *simile* that describes Tom. Can you think up another *simile* to describe him in this moment?

CREATE SOMETHING GREAT

Look at the *triads* (3 part lists) in the opening paragraph of chapter 8. Imagine you are taking part in an Olympic sporting event of your choice.

Write a detailed paragraph using *triads* to describe your preparations and actions to paint a vivid picture for the reader. Use your senses to bring it to life.

INFER WHAT'S NOT THERE

Ch9: There are two references to war in this chapter. Which war do you think it is? Give reasons for your answer. Why do you think the war is mentioned?

Ch9: What worries does Eric have? Who was he playing rugby for? (p48)



CONNECT 4

Ch10: Who are Frankie and Olivia? What do we learn about them?

Ch:10 Names are important in this book. Why do you think Lili is irritated by Tom calling her "**Lee Lee**". Can you think of other occasions when characters are not called by their real names?

READ AND UNDERSTAND


Ch11: Why did Lili's dad not want her to use the internet for her research? Do you think he was right? Why/Why not?

Using your notes, plan and write a magazine article about their life. Include a title, introduction, sub-headings and a conclusion. Add photos or illustrations to your work.

Ch13: What plan/strategy does Eric have to try and win the race?

INFER WHAT’S NOT THERE

Ch15: According to Lili’s dad, what is the difference between **concentrating** and **paying attention**? Do you agree?

Now that mobile phones are everywhere, do you think that these are affecting people’s ability to concentrate or pay attention? Explain your answer.



REFLECT AND RESPOND

Ch15: Why is Lili happy to be learning more about Eric Liddell. Try to give two reasons.

Now you’ve seen the video clip of Eric Liddell does he feel more real to you?

CREATE SOMETHING GREAT

Ch16: Using an atlas or the internet, draw your own illustrated map of China. Label places of interest carefully.



Add **Tientsin** and **Siaochang** (remember their names may now be spelt differently).

CREATE SOMETHING GREAT

Find some paintings of Chinese peonies and paint your own versions in class.

What do peonies represent in China?

What does she mean? Discuss in your group. Do you agree/disagree?



INFER WHAT’S NOT THERE

Ch19: See the last paragraph of this chapter. What happened in 1941 during World War 2?

How do you think these events will impact on Eric Liddell in China? What might happen to him?

REFLECT AND RESPOND

Ch20: Why is Lili excited to discover Eric’s Chinese name?

Ch20: On pages 114-115, we see an adapted version of the opening pages of the book. Why do you think these appear again? Could Eric have said these words?

EXPLORE SOME MORE

Ch20: What does Lili mean by saying that Tom is “*about as cunning as a sledgehammer*”?

Which other *similes* could she have used? Make up some of your own.

CREATE SOMETHING GREAT

In your group, or with a partner, cut & stick strips of paper together to make a timeline for WW2 or the life of Eric Liddell.

Add key dates and events to your timeline along with photos and drawings.

Present then display these in the classroom.

READ AND UNDERSTAND

Ch21: Who was Patrick Scanlan and how did he help his fellow prisoners? (p117 onwards)

Ch21: (p122) “*All shall be well, and all shall be well, and all manner of thing shall be well*” is a quotation from Julian of Norwich. Who was she and what do her words mean?

Ch22: How does the author create a humorous picture of the headmaster on pages 123 and 124?


Ch22: Lili has a complex national identity. Reflect on your own identity. What matters to you? Where matters to you? What about the people you know? Where/what might matter to them?

Ch25: Why does Eric smile and say he wouldn't miss the race for the world when he knew that he was “*wholly unfit to compete*”?

What does this tell us about the type of person he is? Do you admire him?

EXPLORE SOME MORE

Ch26: How does the author show the debate going on inside Lili about whether to compete or not? Is it effective?

Are you surprised at Lili's decision about the race? Why/why not?

What would you have done in her shoes and why?



CHAPTERS 25-28



REFLECT AND RESPOND

Ch27: Compare Eric's final race with his Olympic final.

How do you feel about him losing his final race? Explain your answer.



EXPLORE SOME MORE

Ch28: Read p152 and then look back at p148.

What do we learn about Eric's last days that we didn't know before? What does that tell you about him?

INFER WHAT'S NOT THERE

Ch28: Do you think Lili would have won Sports Day if she had run?

Ch28: Why do you think Tom came to the hospital? Why did he thrust a bunch of grapes at Lili as if “*they were about to explode*”?

CREATE SOMETHING GREAT
